- Mark 12:29-31


Love is central to who God is and to all the ways we are to understand our life together. First, to be love is to be at least a little like the Divine. Every experience of love is an experience of God.

At the end of January, Caroline took over as Music Director and Collaborative Pianist. Leading much of the music at LOTM, there was much to be proud of including (but certainly not limited to) the following.

- The choir collaborated with the Littles to perform a piece alongside a slide show for Palm Sunday. Then they sang with the Rocky Mountain Brass Quintet and Ann Steele on organ at the Easter services.
- Choir members performed instrumental and vocal solos as well as duets as part of worship.
- Christy Reinking and John Preckshot regularly organized worship led by guitars and basses.
- Toward the end of the year, for Advent, the choir performed Joseph Martin's Tapestry of Light and then sang at the 7:30 service on Christmas Eve.

Donna Clark agreed to continue as our sole Office Administrator.


We were sorry to say goodbye to our Choir Director, Chris Keelan, and her husband, Nick.

While many people participate with this care team, Christy Reinking is the coordinator.



#### YAK AND YARN

Holly Holden has been leading a group she claims is just a fellowship group to socialize and peruse fabric arts. Yet, they also care for others in that socialization and by making prayer shawls. *In 2023, Y&Y distributed 80 handmade items, up from the year before.* 

In conjunction with the Prayer Shawl Ministry knitting instructions were provided to 1 person and a \$50 donation was made to LOAF in memory of Connie Haseloh.

They are looking to add new people to the group this year.

### DAY SERVICES

We have offered our homeless men and women in Summit County a place where they can come twice a week, on Wednesday and Friday afternoons from 1-4, to take a hot shower, do laundry, have a hot meal, and relax within a supportive community. We also offer warm clothing and a high-quality sleeping bag for those who need them.

The number of people taking advantage of our program varies by season and weather. On a typical day, we usually have between 8-18 people coming for our service.

Our clients all suffer from mental health issues, or drug & alcohol addiction. Many will secure jobs of various kinds but are rarely able to maintain them because of their issues.

The food we serve may be donated by the Community Dinner, but on occasion, there is a need to buy food and other supplies such as laundry products.

We have been fortunate in 2023 to be the recipient of a monetary gift from St. John the Baptist Episcopal Church, as well as the Interfaith Council. We are beyond grateful for these gifts, as well as the generous support from the congregation of Lord of the Mountains. Without this support, these most vulnerable people in our community could not survive.



#### LOVE ONE ANOTHER FUND

LOAF is used to assist members within our congregation or in our community when they find they have financial shortfalls.

In the past year, this fund has been used to secure a motel room for a vulnerable family whose car broke down in Summit County, as well as to help new immigrants who have come from Central America to buy warm clothing and other necessary items. Other uses include helping a young man who could not afford the repairs needed for his car, so he could get to his job.

We have on occasion contributed towards rent for families who had mounting medical/dental bills

This ministry is entirely funded by the generosity of the congregation at Lord of the Mountains.

This year, the team looks forward to continuing recycling and composting efforts in addition to determining more ways within the congregation to reduce our environmental footprint.

We are, of course, a community of people and this means there is need to foster that community through various social and communal events. 2023 was full of soup suppers before midweek worship in both Lent and Advent as well as all sorts of fun events like our Oktoberfest.

## ENDOWMENT COMMITTEE

The Charitable Endowment fund was created in 1994 with a generous gift of \$120,000. The purpose of the endowment fund is to provide for mission work beyond the operational budget of our congregation. The committee meets quarterly to respond to grant requests. During the 2023 fiscal year the committee distributed the following gifts:

- 2022 4th Q \$1,000 Bethany Immigration Services
- 2023 1st Q \$3,000 Colorado Mountain College
- 2023 2nd Q \$1,500 World Central Kitchen Ukraine
- 2023 3rd Q \$2,000 Faces of Karma
- 2023 4th Q \$500 Summit Choral Society

At the end of 2023 the Charitable Gift Endowment investment was \$145,327.93.

The Legacy Gift Endowment is currently worth \$52,599.25. The Legacy Gift Endowment is an opportunity for members of the congregation to make a transformation gift to Lord of the Mountains that will allow the congregation to support both mission and ministry into the future.

# While a fair amount of our ministry and work can and do happen without financial resources, there is still much that requires money.

We are immensely thankful for all the gifts you gave in 2023 and the ways you continue to support the mission and ministry of LOTM.

We were able to end the year roughly \$3,000 ahead of where we planned because giving ended better than projected and we kept expenses down. We still had a deficit and while this next year looks to have a deficit spending plan as well, we hope to work our way closer to a balanced spending plan.
